Zero defects in Test Equipment Manufacturing

At Test Equipment Manufacturing's quarterly meeting, Larry Fahey, manager of Manufacturing Engineering/Quality Control for T.E.M., presented 16 employees with T-shirts for reaching or exceeding quality goals in their Zero Defect Program.

At the start of the second quarter, T.E.M.'s Quality Control organization introduced the program which shifts management's emphasis from defect detection to defect prevention. This approach focuses on the human factor in production. The goals of the program include increased individual awareness and responsibility concerning quality in manufacturing.

The program provides each assembler with feedback on his/her work through an In-Process Inspection Report. This information is gathered from Quality Control Inspection Reports and shared with the employee in a personal meeting with a member of the Quality organization.

Once an individual has demonstrated the ability to achieve a given quality level, management demonstrates its confidence in that person by not requiring a 100 percent inspection of his/her work. When the goal is maintained for three consecutive months, T.E.M. presents the assembler with a T-shirt in recognition of the accomplishment. If the goals are met for a second three month period, the individual is recognized as a certified assembler, and the inspection of his/her work is reduced to a sample plan.

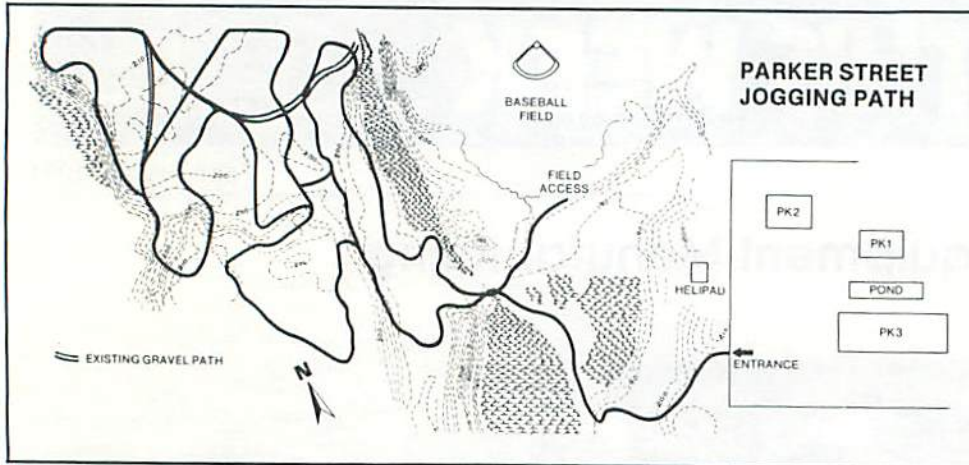
Starting in July, the 12 part series will be aired over 275 public broadcasting stations across the country. This is the company's first venture in public television underwriting.

Mechanical CAD/CAM package for internal use

An effective and inexpensive distribution of Mechanical CAD/CAM capabilities is now available throughout Digital. The UNIGRAPHICS system, a software package licensed from McAuto of McDonnell Douglas Corp., has been contracted to provide capabilities in the areas of geometric definition, manipulation, verification; mass properties analysis and numerical control programming.

To be a stand-alone user, all that is needed is an 11 type CPU (-11/23, -11/70) running RSX-11M or RSX-11M - PLUS, appropriate peripherals, TEKTRONIX 4014

based terminals, a one time software license fee and a yearly support/update fee. VAX based capability will be available in the near future.

This is only the first step. The remainder of Mechanical CAD/CAM strategy includes central data base storage and access, networking and sophisticated central and distributed analysis capabilities.

Digital gets WESTLAW approval for word processing systems

Digital's WS78 and WS200 word processing systems have received approval as compatible communications terminals for WESTLAW*, a computerized legal search service.

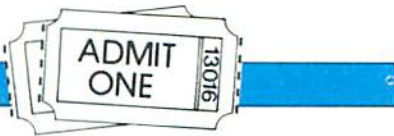

The Digital Computer Museum presents:

The Digital Computer Museum will present Konrad Zuse, designer of the first German computers, in their fourth Pioneer Computer Lecture to be held on March 4 at 5 p.m.

Zuse will discuss the process that led him to build a series of electro-mechanical "equation solvers" that culminated in the building of the first fully operational model of the Z3 in 1941. Although the Z3 was destroyed in World War II, replicas were built in the sixties and are now in museums in Germany.

Konrad Zuse not only designed the first German computers, but is an artist and the developer of one of the first algorithmic languages, Plankalkul. During his visit to Digital, he will speak on Plankalkul at the Spit Brook facility on March 5 at 2 p.m.

The Digital Computer Museum is located at One Iron Way, Marlboro, Mass. It is part of the MR complex. The museum will exhibit a number of Zuse's paintings during the month of March.
